
Early Bird Deadline Reminder

PGG is recruiting!

The Professional Guidance Group (PGG) is responsible for coordinating production of BSA documents prior to final sign-off by the BSA Council. This includes Recommended Procedures and Clinical Guidance. Most documents are authorised

by the special interest groups (SIGs) and the PGG must work with them to agree the guidance and seek expert peer review. The PGG is also responsible for authorising some documents on general topics such as PTA, tympanometry and acoustics.

It is a the core function of the BSA to produce learned guidance, so its good international reputation is dependent on the documents it publishes. The role of the PGG is therefore crucial in coordinating production of documents and includes: review and commenting on draft guidance, ensuring that it is evidence-based, current, relevant, of high impact and quality. The PGG must ultimately uphold high standards that maintains the BSA's reputation.

PGG are seeking individuals who can give some of their time to this important and influential role. It is critical to the BSA's function and supports the whole of the audiology profession. The PGG meets every quarter but PGG members will review (or occasionally author) documents between meetings as they are produced. Documents cover all areas of audiology, so volunteers may be generalists or specialists in any area. The PGG is responsible to the BSA Council.

Survey – What are the current recommendations on how to use sound therapy to treat adult patients diagnosed with Hyperacusis?

BSA Member Nighat Kalsoom and University Hospitals of Derby and Burton are inviting you to take part in a research study.

Before you decide to take part, it is important that you know why they are completing this study and what is involved. Please click <u>here</u> to read the participant Information Sheet.

This research is funded by the National Institute for Health Research (NIHR) and Health Education England (HEE).

Hyperacusis is a condition where sensitivity to normal everyday sound increases to a point of hypersensitivity or reduced sound tolerance and can affect patients in distressing ways (Fackrell et al, 2019, Baguley and Andersson, 2007). Current management interventions include education, signposting to talking therapy/counselling (Stansfeld, 1992) and Sound therapy. Sound therapy may include advice around sound exposure using CDs/Apps, tabletop white noise generators, wearable sound generators or hearing aids. At present there is a lack of clarity for sound therapy such as what type of device to use and how long to use it for. Therefore, this questionnaire will be conducted to explore a consensus on use of sound therapy in adults with Hyperacusis.


